Man Son Bulubembe, Razoof

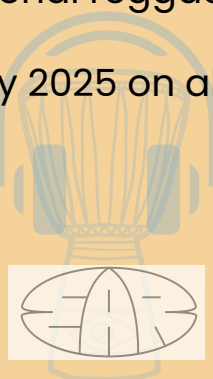

Man Son Bulubembe: Born as Muyomba Gideon Kiwanuka in Kireka, Kampala, Man Son has been deeply connected to music since childhood, inspired by his mother's choir rehearsals. Over the years, he has made a name for himself in the reggae and dancehall scene, collaborating with artists like C. Wyne Nalukalala, sharing stages with Lion Story Band (Burundi), Nilotika Cultural Ensemble, Legends Band, Turbulence, and more. His debut album NZUUNO (Here I Come) dropped in 2022, cementing his place in the reggae world.

Razoof is a producer, DJ, and drummer from Cologne, Germany, now based in Entebbe, Uganda. For over 20 years, he has been shaping reggae, dub, and global electronic music, collaborating with artists from 25 countries.

Alongside reggae legends like Luciano, Lutan Fyah, and Mykal Rose, Razoof has worked with leading female voices from Jamaica such as Keida and Aza Lineage, as well as kora master Pa Bobo Jobarteh and the Bantu Crew from Nigeria. He has also collaborated with various singers from across the African continent, including C Wyne Nalukalala, Bani Fyah, and Jamal Wasswa (Uganda), Binti.Afrika (Kenya), Oge Kimono (Nigeria), and Jhikoman (Tanzania).
